

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

Why introduce myself and the chaplain's role that Chaplain Weldon Thomas and I share on the base? I figure if you are comfortable with us, and know who we are, then we can make this Wing stronger. So who is Chaplain "Father Jim" Bastian? I am the son of a U.S. Marine (on my father's side). I am the brother of a retired Sgt. from the U.S. Army. I am the product of the Kenmore public schools. I moved to Kentucky when I was a teenager when my Dad was down-sized from Ashland Oil, Inc. I graduated with an Electrical Engineering degree from the University of Kentucky (the same fine institution Col. Schmidt attended). I attended theology school near Chicago for three years before graduating from Christ the King Seminary, East Aurora in 1994. And all this I did before the age of 12.

Recently, my parishes that I pastor in West Seneca, St. Bonaventure Church and St. William Church, merged and have had a "change of command." I was "PCS'ed" to a new assignment to be a teacher at St. Joseph Collegiate Institute (St. Joe's). I will be teaching 10th grade religion to 200 eager young minds, specifically Hebrew and Christian Scriptures. This is a new and

challenging experience for me. I am excited to try this new role as a teaching-priest.

Down-sizing and change is sometimes very difficult. It could make a person feel without purpose. (What's next?) I certainly felt this. With many priest friends, I sought one out for shortterm counseling with regard to the changes that I faced in my life. (What's next?) I believe this to be true for most, and it was for me, that in my prayer, I discovered what God's will was for me. I began to see my life had direction and purpose. I realized that my new family consisted of the faculty, staff, and students at St. Joe's; and the 1100+ Airmen of the 914th Airlift Wing and your families. I know of God's blessings. I hope to walk with you on the journey we call LIFE.

Should you be in the situation of change and in need of an ear, a voicing, a place to talk, confidentiality, or the privilege of the confessional – the chapel is the place to come, either for a moment of quiet or a service, and the chaplain is the person to see. We are to 'provide' for

all, and 'perform' for our own. I am a Roman Catholic priest attached and endorsed by both the Diocese of Buffalo and the Archdiocese of the Military. Chaplain Thomas is our protestant chaplain of the Methodist tradition pastoring in Rochester, NY. Senior Airman Aims High to Help Inner-city Youth

One 914th Airman isn't
reaching just to get a better grip on
the mountainside he is climbing; he's
reaching his goal to support a young
person in need.

Senior Airman Adam Rauch, a 914th Aeromedical Evacuation Specialist is slated to climb Mount Rainier (located in Washington State) in mid-September to support a

program that helps "at risk" inner city youth.

The Summit for Someone Program is run by an organization called Big City Mountaineers, as well as *Backpacker* magazine. The program raises money for Big City Mountaineers which sends inner-city kids on weeklong backpacking trips. The program is aimed to introduce them to a new environment and teach them positive values. A portion of

the program is used to raise money for working with the youth. The climbers involved in the program receive sponsorship in order to raise the required \$3800.

"Think of it as a walk-a-thon, but instead of walking, we climb a mountain," said Senior Airman Rauch. I love the outdoors, and I know that my experiences in the wilderness have helped shape me into the person I am today. I just wanted to allow someone else, who wouldn't normally have the opportunity to experience that for themselves, the opportunity for the

life changing experience that it can provide," he added.

Senior Airman Rauch uses his passion of assisting people in their times of need as well as his love of mountain climbing and focuses them to fulfill his goal of helping a cause that is bigger than himself.

"I think he's doing the climb because he believes in the cause and wants to help the children through his fund

raising. He also enjoys the outdoors and the challenge of climbing," said Commander of the 914th Aeromedical Evacuation Squadron Lt. Col. Diane DiFrancesco.

Motivation to do this kind of work was not hard to find in Senior Airman Rauch's life. He said his family was a big part of that inspiration to volunteer his time and talents for a greater cause. "Their upbringing taught

me to do whatever I could to help others," added Senior Airman Rauch.

Nature was Senior Airman Rauch's other inspiration. He said he began to love the outdoors and the wilderness when his family would go on hiking and camping trips.

"As I grew older and began backpacking and climbing, my experiences with nature took on a

more personal nature. I began to appreciate the simple beauty that nature provides," said Senior Airman Rauch

Even during a long deployment, Senior Airman Rauch kept focused on the cause he was training for back home, in the states.

Airman Shares Experience

Around the world the Tuskegee Airmen are a true symbol of the strength and precision of the US Military and a true testament of the greatest Air Force in the world. They were a group of young men who had a passion and determination to enlist and become the first black military Airmen, to help fight for freedom around the world. Many people are unaware of the true definition of the Tuskegee Airmen, they are not just pilots but they are all of the African American men and women who were apart of the military, who all had the same goal to fight and win.

Since 1947 the Air force had plans to integrate all units. A year after President Truman created executive order 9981 that directed equality of treatment and opportunity in all United State branches. Since that time the Tuskegee men and women have not been forgotten. The 37th annual Tuskegee Airmen conference was held on July 17th - 20th in the heart of down town Philadelphia. Around the country there are more than 50 different chapters that dedicate there time, educating and honoring the accomplishments of the Tuskegee airmen. The Greater Philadelphia chapter was honored to host this year's event for over two hundred airmen around the country. Active duty and the Air National Guard were in attendance but the event was dominated with Reserve members.

My self Senior Airman Dobney and Chief Master Sgt. Toney Proctor were both selected by the HRDC committee to attend the event to represent Niagara Falls. HRDC stands for Human Resources Development Council and is a committee that only reserve members have that puts a focus on the diversity and attitude of the base. The group brings events to the base such as the job fair and part tacking in the Tuskegee Airmen conference. I have been a member of the base since November 2007. Since then I have gained a stripe, won Airmen of the month and have been a member of HRDC and many other clubs on the base. This conference was my first TDY and I was honored. Every month I try my best to attend a monthly

HRDC meeting chaired buy 914th Vice Commander Colonel Mark Murphy and was selected to go on the trip to Philadelphia. I will never forget the opportunity I had while I was there. Each day was packed with activities to benefit airmen and civilians. Military members had an agenda designed for them. They were able to speak to a panel of generals and military leaders about the different concerns that people were having at their home stations. Out of all of the sessions I had a few favorites, the first was the Chiefs panel. It was a panel made up of chiefs who spoke to the audience on their personal paths through the ranks. No one would question that being a Chief was a true honor but I was most impressed with the respect that both enlisted and commissioned members had for the eight stripes.

I am sure it is not a surprise but my second favorite seminar for the conference was the women's panel. I have never been around so many women of such pose and power. From generals to master sergeants they all loved their jobs and more importantly love the military. I did ask the panel a question and it was as follows, "what skills did they advise that women should sharpen to make sure that women can put their stamp on the new direction of the new Air force or military". Well for the rest of the conference I was known for the "good" question. Well I had stumped a few members of the panel and was jokingly offered a job at the pentagon for it .I was told that technology was key to the direction of the military.

The best panel was the Tuskegee Airmen themselves. Words cannot capture the feeling in the room. They were very honest about their feelings with every question. There were people asking questions about loved ones still over all these years not sure how they had pasted. No matter how serious the question was they managed to have a fantastic sense of humor.


As the conference progressed I was shocked at the big influence they had on education. Saturday, we spent the day at a Guard base with youth from Philadelphia who was interested in all jobs of transportation. It was incredible to see the passion and fire in their eyes as they were taken to all of the different planes on the base and taken through the different shops. That day they also had a youth luncheon were we had eaten with the Tuskegee Airmen and the youth that we spent the day with. Were they has given out a scholarships to youth who have done great things with avionics.

That same night was the Gala. Everyone wore their mess dress and civilians were in gowns and tuxedos. The key speaker was Dr.Guion S. Bluford, Jr. he is the first African American to fly in space. I could not think of anyone who would be better suited to end the conference. The four days that I was there was incredible, I spoke with generals and Tuskegee airmen in elevators. I had lunch with their wives and had the honor to get a glimpse in to their loves. For the men and women who have been apart of a legacy that will never be forgotten. Who broke down barriers and made history it is incredible how humble they are. They have no hate or grudge holding about the way they have been treated in life. Looking at them and speaking to them they have both the wisdom of their years but the same spirit and youthfulness they had so many years ago. They love to fly and they love this country and it was a pure blessing and honor to be one of the few young airmen at the conference and most importantly I was able to represent Niagara Falls.




