

Command and wing recruiters shatter enlistment goal

Air Force Reserve Command recruiters recorded their 8,800th enlistment of the year Aug. 3, breaking the record for reaching their annual recruiting goal the fastest two months before deadline.

The 400 men and women who recruit nationwide for the Air Force Reserve had until Sept. 30, the end of the fiscal year, to make the goal. Their achievement marks the ninth straight year the command recruiters have reached their annual target number for enlistments.

Lt. Gen. Charles E. Stenner Jr., AFRC commander, praised the recruiters and spoke with glowing enthusiasm about their accomplishment

"Our Air Force Reserve recruiters are fantastic," he said. "They have no peer, and they continue to impress me time and time again."

"Not only have they reached their target two months ahead of schedule, but this is the earliest they've ever reached their goal," the general said. "They're number one of all of the Department of Defense's recruiting services for the ninth year in a row. My heartiest congratulations to all of them on a job, once again, extremely well done."

The 914th Airlift Wing recruiting team also set a record for the base with a total of 164 enlistments, shattering the old record of 145 set in 2002.

Senior Master Sgt. Pasquale Muoio, 914th Airlift Wing senior recruiter, praised the efforts of the entire wing in making this record breaking year possible.

"We would not have been able to accomplish such an endeavor without the wing's support," said Muoio. "From leadership identifying overages and vacancies, to the military personnel flight, finance and the Aeromedical Staging Squadron assisting in processing the applicants."

"Even more important was the efforts of each wing member sharing their Air Force Reserve experiences to friends and family members," added Muoio. "The Get 1 Now program was a huge success accounting for 56 of the current 164 accessions, an amazing 34%!"

To make matters more challenging, the command goal was 10 percent higher this year than last.

"I'm extremely proud of the efforts put forth by the recruiting team," said Col. Joe Wilburn, commander of the Air Force Reserve's recruiting force. "This achievement is a direct reflection of the hard work and talent they put towards the task at hand."

There was a panel of power made up of a former Assistant Secretary of the Air Force, a Major General, a Colonel and a Captain. Everywhere one turned they witnessed rank upon rank upon rank. In other cases an Airman may have been intimidated, but at the Tuskegee Airmen's Inc. Conference, this was an oppor-

tunity of a lifetime.

The conference was held at the Palace Station Hotel in Las Vegas, NV. According to the airport shuttle driver, the hotel was where all the locals went to satisfy their gambling appetites. The hotel came equipped with its own buffet, casino, and ballrooms where we spent most of our time. The ballrooms were divided into three sections, with each hosting a program. One was able to attend a panel, training, or a special activity. However, more than anything else, the event was focused and geared toward youth.

On Saturday, August 8, 2009, the day for youth, youth from all over America gathered in Las Vegas, NV for a trip to Nellis Air Force Base. The trip was one part of a much larger initiative to mentor youth. Volunteers showed the students many airplanes including an F-22, F-16 and an original Tuskegee Airman's Red Tail.

Both flu mist and the shot prevent the same 3 strands of the flu. Remember- if you get vaccinated through your civilian doctor, the immunizations clinic needs documentation.

The H1N1 vaccination is in the works with the CDC, their hoping to

accomplish by the fall. This vaccination will be a 2 shot series; meaning most individuals will be receiving a total of 3 flu vaccines this year.

POST 911 GI BILL

BASIC ELIGIBILITY

Minimum 90 days of Title 10 active duty since September 11, 2001, NOT including basic training, IADT or annual tour.

APPLICATION PROCESS: Go to www.gibill.va.gov Click on Post 9/11 GI BILL: Apply for Benefits, then click "Education" Start VONAPP to access the VA Form 22-1990. This step is required to establish a reservist has benefits. Members need to complete this form even if they wish to transfer benefits.

TRANSFER OF BENEFITS: In addition to the basic eligibility for Post 9/11, must have a minimum 6 years active duty or reserve participation for transfer to spouse; 10 years to transfer to dependent child. Must be reserve (not IRR) on the day of transfer election and the duration of 4 year service commitment from 1 Aug 09 or date of transfer election whichever is later. There are exceptions for retirement eligible (see Wing Education and Training office).

- 1. Member completes VA 22-1990 in VONAPP to certify he/she has benefits that can be transferred.
- 2. Member makes election to transfer at https://www.dmdc.osd.mil/TEB HQ AFRC will be responsible to determine if reservist or AGR is eligible to transfer. Enlisted will be required to reenlist/extend before eligibility is approved. All members will be required to sign a statement of understanding before approval. The SOU will be stored in ARMS.
- 3. Once both approvals (VA and AFRC) are received student will complete VA 22-1990e.

Smoking is also prohibited during these hours. On especially hot

days, Muslims may seek permission to reduce or be excused from physical training (including PT Assessments) or limit their time outdoors, duty permitting.

When it comes to faith, some take it very literal or conservatively, some more liberally. So do not judge someone on their particular practice, but be aware some may have these tenets.


