New name, new mission for 107th Air Guard unit

One of the first steps towards a new mission is a new name: the 107th Air Refueling Wing



became the 107th Airlift Wing on April 1.

The name change is a result of a 2005 BRAC decision, which directed the 107th Air Refueling Wing to convert to an Airlift Wing and form an association with the 914th Airlift Wing.

This conversion to an Airlift Wing brings the loss of the unit's KC-135 Air Refuelers. In their place, the air base will have a full complement of C-130H2 aircraft. The 107th Airlift Wing, New York Air National Guard, along with the 914th Airlift Wing, Air Force Reserve, will work together to employ these aircraft.

The association with the 914th Airlift Wing is the second-ever Guard/Reserve association in history, the first-ever in combat delivery. This association will allow the Guardsmen and Reservists to share resources, increasing mission effectiveness and decreasing duplication of effort.

The 107th became an Air Refueling Wing in 1994. After more than 40 years as a fighter group, the name was changed from the 107th Fighter Group to the 107th Air Refueling Wing with the 107th's receipt of KC-135R's. The KC-135's refuel other aircraft in mid-air, operating much like a mobile gas station. The KC-135 is also capable of hauling cargo and troops.

Over the years, the 107th has provided support to numerous operations around the globe while maintaining its state mission. The 107th has provided support for Operations Enduring and Iraqi Freedom, Hurricane Katrina and Western New York's October Storm.

The 107th Airlift Wing will continue to provide support for state and around the globe operations with its new mission, flying C-130H2's. The C-130 offers flexible configurations for various airlift and medical missions. The C-130 is also capable of dropping troops and supplies into rough and hazardous terrain.

As I stare at this blank page, preparing to draft up this article, it reminds me of what we're creating with the Air Force Reserve, Air National Guard Association here at Niagara Falls Air Reserve Station. We're taking a blank canvas and creating an association, comprised of two distinct wings, preparing our personnel and our common aircraft to be current, qualified and ready to fight. Our mission and the members of each unit are noble and working for the right purpose, national defense.

While we're forming the association and meeting the intent of the Base Realignment and Closure law, we will soon be reorganizing the wing according to Gen. Moseley's policy. The Maintenance Group name goes away effective Oct. 1 and becomes The Material Group (MTG). The Material Group will include the Logistics Readiness Squadron (LRS) and Aerial Port (30 APS) which moves from the Mission Support Group. Shortly after this reorganization, a good part of the aircraft maintenance functions



will transition to the Operations Group. For us, the Mobility Air Forces (MAF), the date is yet to be determined for the maintenance moves. The quality assurance function, the Aircraft Maintenance Squadron and most of the Maintenance Operations Flight eventually moves over to the Operations Group.

Wow! What an amazing journey we're on! Change seems to be the only constant in our business. I suggest that change is not the only constant in our profession. I believe that the professionalism, leadership, talent, skills, abilities, commitment, dedication and desire to serve are constant and serve as the bedrock for our success now and in our future combat capability that we offer to the nation. Make sure you can do all aspects of the physical training test or you're actively working with the medical professionals to be able to do that in the future. Get your ancillary training done ahead of time or at least on time.

The profession of arms is not a nine to five job. The profession of arms is a calling and a commitment to sacrifice and service. The uncertainty of the enemy means we cannot relax and take a break from national defense. Until world peace arrives, I look forward to serving with you at Niagara Falls Air Reserve Station.
