

Officials break ground for new Army Reserve Center

The Niagara Falls Air Reserve Station hosted a groundbreaking ceremony April 7 for the newest military construction project in Western New York.

The \$23.6 million Army Reserve Center project includes a training building, an Area Support Activity, an Organizational Maintenance Shop and a storage building.

The project was authorized by the 2005 Base Realignment and Closure Commission. Expected tenants include two medical units, a quartermaster company and a New York National Guard infantry company.

Congresswoman Louise Slaughter, present at the ground break, has been instrumental in the post BRAC consolidation of military operations and future development at NFARS.

Lana and I are very much looking forward to our assignment here. Even though I grew up in nearby Michigan, we have not had the opportunity to explore Western New York. I can already see there are many "must do's" in the area. This is an incredible opportunity for us to serve our great nation and the men and women who serve in the 914th Airlift Wing.

The mission of the United States Air Force is to fly, fight and win in the air, space and cyberspace. The Air Reserve Component -Air Force Reserve and Air National Guard provides, among other things, about 55 percent of our nation's military airlift capability, 80 percent of the nation's Aeromedical Evacuation capability and 60 percent of the nation's Aerial Port operations capability. It's hard to imagine any Joint Force or Combatant Commander able to complete their mission without the capabilities of the Air Reserve Component. Niagara Falls has a rich history of service to the nation in peacetime and in times of war and I look forward to being a part of it.

As I look ahead to my time here, certainly our new ARC association is on the top of my priority list. As you have already discovered, the relationships we build with our counterparts in the 107th Airlift Wing, will be a large part of the success of this association. I ask that you continue to work at your level towards association solutions while always respecting the heritage and traditions we each possess. Many times the public and active component see us as the same, but we know

there are some challenging differences in the way we manage and train. As we lead the way in the ARC association, we have an incredible opportunity to make substantial improvements to the base and create some real efficiencies. As the commander, I've also been asked to balance local unit wants and needs against the bigger world where resources are constrained and balanced against a bigger picture. For example; the draft base plan identifies approximately 165 million dollars in facility upgrades and construction. We have some tough decisions to make in regards to wants and needs.

I have three other priorities that I will briefly outline. The first one should sound familiar; we will continue our mission "current, qualified and ready to fight." In keeping with the operational nature of our mission, we will continue to provide the Joint Task Force and Combatant Commander with combat crews, mission capable aircraft and the specialized, highly-trained support teams

which enable the most effective mobility system in the world. Secondly, we will focus on our conservation. We need to improve our existing work space to reduce energy consumption. Our new facilities will be joint use, environmentally friendly and correctly sized. One of the challenges the installation faces is to reduce our building square footage 20 percent by 2020. Finally, we will seek out joint opportunities. We have a responsibility to our country to provide them with the best Homeland Defense possible. We can only do that by having a functional, working relationship with our sister services. I will encourage our officers and senior enlisted members to volunteer for joint duty missions and obtain the education required by congress to become the joint war-fighters our nation deserves. I was extremely happy to learn that 914th Communications Squadron Commander, Colonel-select John Collins, recently obtained a new assignment at the Joint Task Force-Global Network Operations. There he will direct operations and defense of the Global Information Grid.

In summary, we are a wing that is fullyengaged in the fight. We will focus on executing today while at the same time preparing for the threats of tomorrow. The type of combat we will be involved in will take innovation to keep up with the long list of requirements and remain compliant. It will take resourcefulness; our resources are limited and we cannot expect to succeed using the wasteful model of the past. Finally, it will take Jointness. It is our responsibility and the law that we work as a joint team. The men and women of the 914th Airlift Wing are just the key America needs to defend her today and tomorrow. I am excited and I am proud to join this great team in our noble endeavor.

In brief...

National Security Personnel System under review

The National Security Personnel System is under review at the request of officials in the Defense Department and the Office of Personnel Management. The review was announced March 16 and could take three to six months to complete. The findings and recommendations are expected to be delivered in late summer.

Department of Defense officials are still determining the structure of the review, but it will likely be an external review to provide an objective assessment. In addition, DOD has suspended conversions of GS positions to NSPS until at least October.

New policy refines ancillary, expeditionary skills training

Senior leaders issued new policy guidance in March to streamline ancillary training and expeditionary skills training programs. Two new guidance memorandums revise Air Force Instruction 36-2201, Training Development, Delivery and Evaluation, and address four new categories of ancillary training: annual Total Force awareness, selected force training, event-driven training and expeditionary skills training.

The new policy on ancillary training, signed March 26, establishes responsibilities for program management and describes the gatekeeper process for vetting ancillary training requirements. The new guidance also includes a list of ancillary training no longer required, including Constitution Day training, crime prevention, family care plan brief, local area survival training, equal opportunity for supervisors of civilians, cultural awareness and initial security orientation-uncleared version.

The Veterans Affairs Department has launched a new "Returning Veterans" Web site to welcome home veterans of the Iraq and Afghanistan conflicts.

The Web site at http:// www.oefoif.va.gov focuses on the needs and questions of returning veterans, and will feature videos, veterans' stories and a blog where veterans are encouraged to post feedback. The site also will restructure the traditional index-ofbenefits format found on other VA pages into question-based, categorized and easily navigated links by topic. This will allow veterans to find benefits of interest easily and discover related benefits as they explore, officials said.

Equally important, maintaining spiritual fitness can also undergird what we do physically and mentally. For people of faith,






